In the sphere of extension activities, our College persisted on its social responsibility by undertaking various programmes and activities in association with N.S.S., N.C.C. and other clubs and forums.

The programme envisaged setting up SWAP shops at 93 places across the state. Here reusable products that are of no use by any family can be conserved and given to another free of cost.
- In association with the Taluk Hospital, Punalur, a cleanliness programme was conducted in the Hospital premises.
- As part of the general legislative assembly election 2016 (SVEEP), an awareness programme was organised by the NSS Unit and Election Commission. In accordance with the programme, signature collection campaign was organized and saplings were planted.

- Conducted a seminar by Human Right Cell on human rights day.
- Theatre Club and Media club jointly organized a seminar cum video presentation
- Bhoomitrasena, Nature club took initiative to make campus green and ecofriendly by planting tree saplings in the premises of the campus.
- Environmental club took initiative to make the campus a "plastic free campus"
- Nature club conducted two video presentations and debates based on presentation.
- All other forums and clubs organized different programmes including seminars and activities for students.

- Three NCC cadets participated in PRDC.

- Many cadets were selected to participate in various state level and national level camps.
- Provided volunteer services at various programmes organized by the college and Governmental organizations.

- One of the candidates won the Best Cadet Award this year
- Six NCC cadets of this college got selection in Indian Army.

Additional Skill Acquisition Program (ASAP)

As part of Additional Skill Acquisition Programme (ASAP)of the college, classes for communication skills, I.T. skills and trade skills were conducted for 30 students who were selected through a face to face interview.

An orientation class for the second batch of ASAP was conducted for the First Year Degree students with Ms.Anjali , the Programme Manager of Keralapuram SDC as the Resource Person on 8/8/2016 in the College Auditorium. Hundreds of students participated in the programme from different UG Courses and application forms were distributed among the interested students. An interview was conducted for the skill allotment to the selected students at Ayoor SDC.

After the selection process a PTA meeting was organised on 11 /10 /16 in the College Auditorium in the presence of the Principal and Ms.Anjali, Programme Manager of Punalur SDC. The classes of ASAP started from 24/11/2016 with Ms.Sruthi as the SDE and Mr.Vineedh Kumar as the Programme Manager in our college. The scheduled time is 9.00 am to 10.00am in the Seminar Hall. The classes for the Skill Course are to be conducted on Saturdays at Punalur SDC. Among the 27 students Blessy L Achankunju and Akshaya Krishna (APL-General) have been sponsored by the District Collector. The Foudation course of 2015-2016 batch has been completed on 23/11/2016 and the classes for the Skill course are undergoing.

An orientation class of Summer Skill Skool 2016-2017 for the Final Year Degree students was organised on 27/01/16 in the College Auditorium. Many students have registered for the classes and attended in their respective venues. On 16/02/2017 an orientation class of CET was conducted under the guidance of Mr.Anoop, the P.M of Ayoor SDC at the College Auditorium for the final year UG &PG students. After soliciting the applications from the interested students an interview was conducted at SG College, Kottarakkara for the selection of students for the 21 days residential training programme from 24/2/17-1/3/17. Six students were selected from our college for the respective training programme which is intended to be held during the vacation period.

• Career aspiration classes, group talks, classes on how to face interviews and so on were organized by career guidance cell.

- Various job fests inside and outside campus was organised for final year degree and PG students with the Support of ASAP.
- Training in different value added courses such as ornamental fish culturing, aquarium making etc were conducted with the support of the Zoology department.
- Interactive classes with veterans with the cooperation of BMC for farming were conducted
- Training in Ornamental flower making and jewellery making for girls students were organised in association with the Women's Study Unit of the college.

The Counselling cell plays a vital role in students wellbeing. Different sessions on counselling and individual counselling were organised by the counselling cell in order to address the mounting stress and strain problems found among student at both UG and PG levels.

Administrative procedures

- Training was given to the Non- teaching staff for operating the 'SPARK', Government of Kerala.
- Training was given to office staff in operating computer.
- Daily administrative feedback from the office was collected by Office Superintendent and Principal.
- Treasury transactions, Provident fund (GAIN PF) and Income Tax related operations had become online and were carried out through the SPARK online system. Updating activities and achievements in the College website are in progress. Feasibility studies are in progress to digitalize the administrative management, admission management, library management and Internal Exam procedures.

- PTA meetings had been held and feedbacks from parents were collected with regard to academics and other functioning of the college.
- Tutors in charge of each UG and PG programmes monitor the academic progress and other activities of their respective classes
- 6.3Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:
 6.3.1Curriculum Development

Curriculum is developed by the University. The Choice Based Credit System followed at present in the college facilitates horizontal movement enabling the students to make their choices. Open courses based on future development are available to students irrespective of their main subjects.

6.3.2Teaching and Learning

Apart from conventional lectures and taught lessons,

- Teachers attended Orientation courses /refresher courses /summer/winter schools etc to update their knowledge on their subjects and to get in touch with the recent developments in their area of study.
- The faculty made use of every opportunity to enhance their knowledge by participating in seminars/symposia and through paper presentations.
- Special sessions had been given to students for seminar presentations.
- Encouraged the use of online resources such as e-journals and e-mail.
- Cooperative learning/group learning through project work for final year UG Students.

6.3.3Examination and Evaluation

The classes and examination schedule of all degree programs are scheduled by the University of Kerala. Our College follows Semester system with Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA).

- At the college level two internal examinations are conducted per semester for both UG and PG
- The teachers make an analysis of the performance of students after every internal test and external examination in departmental meetings.
- Periodical assignments and Presentations are assigned to PG students.
- Internal examination and its evaluation are carried out in a transparent manner. The students are allowed to check the evaluated answer scripts to ensure transparency and fairness.
- Internal marks are given fully based on performance.

6.3.4Research and Development

Research Promotion Cell has been established with the objective of facilitating, recording, and regulating all the academic and collaborative research projects in the college.

- Gave timely intimation to teachers so as to enable them to apply for research projects in UGC, DST etc.
- Department of Chemistry and Mathematics are planning to upgrade into research centres.
- Facilitated participation of faculties in seminars, conferences, publication of articles, books and research work.
- Proposals were submitted for four minor projects.
- Compulsory project works were done in established research institutes.

6.3.5Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

- Procured more new books and journals
- Language lab and Computer lab were renovated.
- Library Automation works are in progress.
- Ensured Internet access in all the Departments.
- Introduced new gymnasium equipment.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

Human Resource Management in the College was effectively executed in the following manner

- Faculties were encouraged to attend refresher courses, orientation courses, short term courses and workshops.
- Non teaching staffs were encouraged to undergo periodic training in computer handling.
- Distributing additional administrative work to the teachers.
- Technical sessions with experts who shared their knowledge and expertise
- Organized Staff tour.
- Shortage in manpower is regularly intimated by the management and vacancies were filled at the earliest

6.3.7Faculty and Staff recruitment

- Staff recruitment is done by state government based on the proposals sent from the College management. The recruitment of the faculty and non-teaching staff is done on the basis of the type of post created strictly by following the rules and regulations laid down by the government, university and UGC. Qualification, eligibility criteria, and pay scale are as per the UGC & state government norms
- The temporary teaching and non-teaching staff for non-grant or professional or add-on courses are recruited for one year, at the institutional level.

6.3.8Industry Interaction / Collaboration

All the Departments of the college have excellent links with the neighboring industries,

As a part of syllabus BSc students visited Sangrose Pharmaceutical Limited, Mavelikara. A few alumni of the college are in touch with these industries. As part of the curriculum, fourth semester MSc. students did their projects at KMML Chavara, NIIST Thiruvananthapuram etc. Final year degree students of the Department of Chemistry and Department of Zoology visited The Fertilizers and Chemicals Travancore LTD, (FACT), Kochi, Ernakulam, Kerala, CAReKeralam Ltd, KINFRA Park, Thrissur, Kerala. Matsyafed Prawn Hatchery & Research Centre, Kollam, Kerala, Botanical gardens in Ooty and Mysore etc. Forest Department and Kerala Police have organized various programmes for the students and local people.

6.3.9 Admission of Students

Admission to PG and UG Program are now processed through centralized online system managed by the University of Kerala. Students are selected for admission on the basis of merit, past academic record and interviews. Reservation policies of the government are strictly followed in the college.

6.4Welfare schemes for Teaching and non-teaching

Welfare schemes available for the teaching and non-teaching like festival advance, GPF Loan, Housing Loan, PF, EPF, ESI, GIS etc. In case of medical emergency, funds will be raised from the staff for the patient. Fund is also set up to provide financial assistance to the children of the non-teaching staff to pursue higher education. Maternity Leave of six months is provided for the female staff (2% availed).

Annexure-II

Faculty Evaluation Report

(2016-17)

During the academic year 2016-17, a faculty evaluation form has been prepared by the IQAC and circulated among the students with the objective of collecting feedback from the students regarding the various aspects of teaching such as knowledge of the subject, approachability, teaching performance, method of teaching etc. The questionnaire was prepared and distributed to all the departments. Each faculty was supposed to distribute it to the various classes they engage and collect a minimum of 30 feedback reports. In each class a random number of students had been approached and were asked to fill up the feedback form on a grade scale ranging from A to D. These feedbacks were properly analysed and a feedback report has been prepared based on this.

The following are some of the major findings of the faculty evaluation report

- Nearly 95% of students are content with the method of teaching process imparted to them
- Students are also satisfied with the skill and subject knowledge of the faculties

- Students are happy about the way of interaction, approachability and friendliness of the teachers
- Some of the students expressed their concern at the time constrain to cover the vast syllabus
- They are pleased at the manner by which internal examinations are conducted and the way by which results are announced
- Students demanded more ICT enabled teaching methods as it is more comprehensible to them
- Feedbacks from parents were also properly analysed and proper steps and initiatives were taken to address those shortcoming.
