15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

The college currently follows the Choice Based Credit and Semester System (CBCSS) that was implemented in the year 2010. The system allows students to choose courses from other disciplines in their fifth semester. The University of Kerala under which the college is affiliated is all set to implement the NEP based Four Year Under Graduate Programme (FYUGP) from the next academic year onwards Discussions have taken place in BOS forums and the university's academic council concerning curriculum framework and design. The National Education Policy aims to enhance quality education in the higher education sector. NEP allows students to select courses from a wide range of disciplines, including sciences, social sciences, arts, humanities, sports, and one of the listed Indian languages. This approach is designed to foster critical thinking, versatility, adaptability, problem-solving, analytical skills, flexibility, and effective communication among learners. Additionally, the policy enhances and expands opportunities for research by promoting a holistic and interdisciplinary framework. To acquaint teachers with new courses the college plans to organise workshops and encourage faculty members to participate in Faculty Development Programs (FDPs) and workshops hosted by universities or other institutions

16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) is an initiative by the Ministry of Electronics and Information Technology and the Ministry of Education, enabling the transfer or redemption of credits earned by students from one institution to another. Currently, the college, affiliated with the University of Kerala, follows the university's Choice-Based Credit Semester System (CBCSS) curriculum, which does not support multiple entry and exit options. However, with the planned introduction of the NEP-based Four-Year Undergraduate Programme (FYUGP) from the next academic year, the college is set to adopt the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC). Under the existing CBCSS framework, students can continue their studies and progress to the next semester even if they have backlogs. They also have the option to transfer to another institution with approval from the affiliating university. The college actively encourages students to earn additional credits through participation in activities such as NSS, NCC, sports, and the arts. Furthermore, it promotes online learning opportunities through platforms like Swayam and NPTEL.

17.Skill development:

Skill development is a core component of the curriculum, designed to equip students with both practical competencies and academic expertise. The college offers certificate courses in TALLY ERP, Communicative English, Microsoft Excel, Health and Fitness, and Economics in Everyday Life, all aligned with the National Skills Qualifications Framework (NSQF). Additionally, the college is authorised to provide skill-based programmes initiated by the Higher Education Department of the Kerala Government and the Kerala Development and Innovation Strategic Council (KDISC), including ASAP and YIP. To further enhance skill development, the college organises specialised classes and career training sessions, with a focus on strengthening vocation-based education and cultivating essential soft skills. Students are also given opportunities to partake in internships, and collaboration with industries for laboratory work to provide students with practical exposure and hands-on experience. Students are provided with opportunities to develop their leadership skills by serving as office bearers in the College Union. The college integrates humanistic and ethical values into its educational framework through initiatives like the National Service Scheme (NSS), National Cadet Corps (NCC), and various student clubs and cells. Clubs and Cells offer training opportunities that enable students to nurture and refine their talents in areas such as dance, music, drama, writing, and public speaking, equipping them to excel both personally and professionally. Participation in these activities is mandatory, with students required to engage in a minimum of 120 hours of NSS training, 60 hours of NCC training, or 45 hours of involvement in club activities. These multifaceted efforts aim to produce well-rounded individuals equipped with both technical expertise and strong ethical foundations.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

The college is situated in the state of Kerala, where the mother tongue is Malayalam. Except for disciplines in regional languages, the curriculum is primarily designed in English. Students have the option to choose Malayalam or Hindi as their second language, which they can study up to the fourth semester. Although, English is the medium of instruction, the college also employs Malayalam to facilitate better comprehension, particularly for students from rural backgrounds who have studied in Malayalam-medium schools up to the 10th standard. The curriculum integrates the study of Indian languages, including Malayalam and Hindi, enabling students to gain a deeper understanding of their origins and literary traditions. The syllabus also incorporates the Indian Knowledge System, with courses

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such as Indian Writings in English, Indian Aesthetics, and 20th Century Malayalam Literature in Translation. Additionally, works by prominent Indian writers are also included in the curricula of BA English and Communicative English, Hindi and Malayalam. Programmes like BA History and MA World History and Historiography delve into vast areas of historical knowledge, fostering a nuanced understanding of India's rich cultural and historical legacy. The institution embraces India's cultural diversity by organising celebrations of traditional festivals and culturally significant days. Students actively participate in cultural events, which promote awareness of the nation's diverse heritage. Furthermore, days of national importance are observed to rekindle pride in India's rich cultural and historical legacy.

19. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE): Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

The college affiliated with the University of Kerala, Thiruvananthapuram, is committed to achieving excellence in education through a focus on outcome based education and knowledge acquisition. The college offers undergraduate and postgraduate programmes in Arts, Commerce, and Science adhering to the curriculum prescribed by the University of Kerala. The curriculum is designed specifically to deliver Programme Outcomes (POs), Programme Specific Outcomes (PSOs), and Course Outcomes (COs), emphasising the development of essential life skills, vocational competencies, intellectual abilities, and interpersonal skills. To achieve these objectives, the students engage in team projects, laboratory work, and self-directed learning activities. Each academic department fosters holistic skill development by encouraging active participation in both academic and extracurricular activities. Various clubs along with NCC and NSS units, provide opportunities for students to enhance their vocational, communication and interpersonal skills. The Science Departments prioritise experiential learning through hands-on laboratory work, while all departments offer six months of project preparation training, ensuring alignment with the course structure. Recognising the importance of emotional intelligence in personal and professional success, the college offers mentoring and counselling sessions to nurture self-awareness, empathy, and emotional resilience. The attainment of course outcomes is evaluated using internal and external assessments. The college also takes pride in its wellestablished Department of Physical Education, which is dedicated to identifying and nurturing talent in sports, contributing to the development of athletes who excel at national and international levels. Through these diverse initiatives, Sree Narayana College, Punalur, strives to create a dynamic and inclusive learning

environment that empowers students to excel academically, professionally, and personally

20.Distance education/online education:

Sree Narayana College, Punalur affiliated with the University of Kerala, offers only offline regular programmes and does not have a distance learning study centre. However, the institution has embraced blended learning to adapt to the evolving educational landscape. During the COVID-19 pandemic, the college successfully transitioned to online education, enhancing its internet infrastructure to support live sessions and recorded lectures. Teachers and students effectively utilised various ICT tools, including Moodle, Google Classroom, and Zoom, YouTube channels for online teaching and assessment. Students are encouraged to enrol in NPTEL courses, with technical support provided by their respective departments. Our college is a local chapter of NPTEL co-ordinated by IIT, Chennai from 2020 onwards. 3710 is the LC Id. of the college. Faculty members have developed engaging and well-structured classroom activities to enrich the learning experience. Assignments were submitted through platforms such as Google Classroom or Moodle, streamlining the evaluation process and facilitating efficient record-keeping. Through these initiatives, the college continues to adapt and innovate in response to the changing demands of modern education.

1.1 - Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 - The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

The college offers eight undergraduate programme under CBCSS and four postgraduate programmes under the semester framework as per the University of Kerala guidelines. The academic calendar, prepared annually in alignment with university notifications, is made available on the college website. The academic framework includes detailed academic plans, the CLMC, a structured admission process, teacher's diaries, tutorial systems, and open forums. Curriculum delivery is facilitated through IQAC mechanisms, ensuring quality teaching, mentoring, collaborative learning, and student engagement. New students participate in orientation programmes and bridge courses to address knowledge gaps and ease their transition into the curriculum. Departments allocate classes and syllabi systematically, leveraging online platforms like Google Meet, Zoom, and Moodle for teaching and assessments. Student-centric practices, including seminars, assignments, webinars, and a comprehensive question bank, enhance academic and research capabilities. The library, automated with LIBSOFT, supports open access and curriculum integration. Mentoring systems such as tutorials, mentor-mentee, and remedial coaching provide academic and personal support to weak students, while field trips and guest lectures offer practical exposure. The Student Support Programme delivers personalized assistance, and periodic open house meetings strengthen connections between teachers, students, and parents. This holistic approach ensures effective curriculum delivery and fosters all-rounded student development.

1.1.2 - The institution adheres to the academic calendar including for the conduct of Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE)

The college, affiliated with the University of Kerala, follows the curriculum and syllabi prescribed by the respective Boards of Studies. An Academic Calendar, drafted by IQAC based on the University Calendar and approved by the College Council, is distributed at the start of each academic year among the students. It schedules key activities like internal examinations, assignment submissions, result publication, seminars, arts day, sports day, and other events.

Undergraduate programmes follow the CBCSS system, while postgraduate programmes adopt the Elective system. CIE contributes 20 marks for UG courses and 25 marks for PG courses. For PG theory, evaluation includes internal exams, assignments, seminars, and attendance; for practicals, it assesses test papers, laboratory performance, and record-keeping. Students undergo a bridge course for the semester system. Internal examinations are conducted by the college and End Semester Examination is conducted by the university.CIE marks are consolidated, approved, and published before being uploaded to the university website after grievance redressal.

CLMC monitors CIE andresults are published promptly, and ncommunicated to the students and parents before uploading the marks to the University. Extraand revision classes are also being arranged to complete and revise the portions.

The Women's Study Unit collaborates with organizations to conduct programmes on transgender sensitization, self-defense training, and women's rights, while various departments offer income-generating training in crafts, jewelry making, and organic farming. 2.5 - Evaluation Process and Reforms

Sree Narayana College, affiliated with the University of Kerala, has a robust and transparent mechanism for conducting internal and

external examinations. The Choice-Based Credit and Semester System (CBCSS) is implemented at both undergraduate and postgraduate levels. These programs include Continuous Evaluation (CE) and End Semester Evaluation (ESE). During orientation programs, students are informed about procedures for addressing issues related to marks and their rectification. The College Level Monitoring Committee prepares an academic action plan. The Departmental Level Monitoring Committee organizes meetings to allocate classes and distribute syllabi among faculty members. Departments maintain a portion allocation register and teachers' diaries, ensuring systematic progress. The College Council functions as the Internal Examination Committee and appoints an internal examination coordinator to oversee the entire process. Answer sheets are evaluated, and marks are published on the notice board within a week of the internal examination. Assignments are assigned at the start of each semester, with students required to submit them within the stipulated timeframe. A consolidated attendance statement is prepared monthly and displayed on the notice board. Departments submit question papers to the Internal Examination Committee, and a finalized copy of the consolidated CE marks is handed over to the CLMC for submission to the University.

2.5.2 - Mechanism to deal with internal examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient

he college adheres to the rules of the University of Kerala for conducting Continuous Internal Evaluation (CE). A centralized system is in place to manage internal examinations. The Internal Examination Committee collects question papers from departments on a pre-determined date set by the College Council.

Teachers evaluate the answer scripts within the stipulated time, and marks are assigned strictly based on performance. Students are given an opportunity to verify the corrected answer scripts and the corresponding marks.

A three-tier Grievance Redressal mechanism addresses students' concerns related to Continuous Internal Evaluation. This mechanism involves:

1. Head of the Department (HOD) at the initial level,

- 2. Departmental Level Monitoring Committee (DLMC) at the intermediate level, and
- 3. College Level Monitoring Committee (CLMC) at the higher institutional level. Additionally, a University Level Monitoring Committee functions at the apex level for grievance redressal.

Once the valuation is complete, the answer scripts are returned to students, enabling them to review their performance and identify any discrepancies. Faculty members consolidate the CE marks, which are then reviewed and approved by the Head of the Department and the Principal before being published in the department.

Grievances, if any, are resolved as per the prescribed regulations, and retests are conducted for students who were unable to attend the internal examinations.

2.6 - Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

ree Narayana College, Punalur, affiliated with the University of Kerala, adheres to the syllabus approved by the University. These revisions are effectively communicated to the faculty through orientation programs and workshops.

The College-Level Monitoring Committee (CLMC) convenes meetings and directs departments to organize discussions on curriculum revisions. INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

4.1 - Physical Facilities

4.1.1 - The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

The college offers a total of 12 programs, comprising 8 undergraduate and 4 postgraduate programs. It is equipped with 32 classrooms; including 11-ICT enabled smart classrooms, along with 8 science labs and 4 computer labs. Additionally, there is a seminar hall for hosting seminars and workshops. The auditorium serves as a venue for meetings, assemblies, art competitions, yoga classes, and various other programs. The significance of science labs lies in their role for practical learning and examinations. The four computer labs cater to classes in BA English and Communicative English, B.Com, BSc Mathematics, and BSc Physics. The college provides comprehensive facilities for examinations and administrative functions within the college office. Students have access to photocopying, library services, and the internet on the

college premises. The library is fully automated, using LIBSOFT software, OPAC Mobile app, and N-List. It boasts a collection of 21,532 books covering various disciplines, along with journals, magazines, and newspapers. Furthermore, the college has a Women's Amenity Centre and a cafeteria with a stationary store. Dedicated rooms are allocated for IQAC, NCC, NSS, FSA, university and internal exams, management, PTA, Counselling Cell, and Grievance & Redressal Cell.

The college nurtures students' cultural aptitude with ample facilities and conducts training programs supervised by faculty for college and university level competitions. The Physical Education Department, renowned for its achievements, consistently secures second or third place in intercollegiate level competitions for athletics and games over the past decade. Medals have been earned in interuniversity competitions, and the department boasts a modern Multi-Gymnasium and Health club with cardio and strength equipment. An Open Gymnasium is actively used by both students and faculty. The college's 1965-designed playground spans 4000 sq.m, hosting athletics, football, and cricket tournaments, while the 200-meter Athletic track adds to its features. Established in 2006, the fitness center covers 110 sq.m, offering fitness training, and an indoor badminton court is available. The library is equipped with 21,532 printed books, including reference books, 19 magazines, 7 newspapers, and 10 journals. Membership is extended to students, teaching and non-teaching staff. Additionally, 10 systems with internet connection are provided for students and staff to use N-

LIST and INFLIBNET facilities, each user having individual login and passwords. To ensure data security and selective access, LIBSOFT is organized into two modules: System Administrator Module and User Module, each protected with different passwords. The library offers Web and Android-OPAC for remote access, and the automated Gate Register facilities manage daily visits, providing usage statistics for all categories of visitors.

1. Solid Waste Management

The biodegradable waste undergoes treatment in a biogas plant, where it is converted into both biogas and biofertilizers. Non-biodegradable wastes like plastics are systematically collected and handed over to the Municipal Corporation for proper disposal.

2. Liquid Waste Management

The campus is equipped with an underground drainage system and leach pits designed to treat liquid waste originating from the hostel,

canteen, wash areas, and restrooms. These systems ensure that wastewater is managed effectively without contaminating the surroundings.

3. E-Waste Management

The institution systematically collects electronic waste (e-waste) from various departments and ensures its safe storage until formal arrangements are made with specialised e-waste recycling agencies.

4. Biomedical Waste Management

Since 2019, in collaboration with the Government Taluk Hospital, Punalur, the institution has been conducting a comprehensive Clinical, Anthropometric, and Biochemical (CAB) survey. This initiative aims to bridge critical data gaps concerning

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nutritional status and lifestyle diseases.

During the academic year 2023-24, the college organised a Health Audit with enthusiastic student participation under the guidance of medical officers from the Government Taluk Hospital. The audit involved the evaluation of various health parameters, including Random Blood Sugar (RBS), pulse rate, blood pressure, blood oxygen levels, Body Mass Index (BMI), and blood group identification. Based on the findings, students requiring medical intervention were referred to the Government Taluk Hospital for appropriate care. Further emphasising its commitment to student welfare, the college provided financial assistance and other forms of support to students addressing significant health concerns.

Beyond Health Audits, the college regularly conducts capacitybuilding programmes such as Yoga and workshops, along with seminars and webinars led by health experts. These initiatives are designed to promote healthy lifestyles and foster overall well-being within the student community.
